Perhaps I have never been at the same posts as the author, but perhaps we are seeing things with different eyes and living vastly different lifestyles. CHINA: OPPORTUNITY OR THREAT?

Though much of our attention has been focused recently on the Middle East, it seems appropriate to take a morning to focus on China as a growing economic and political power in world affairs. Join us on **Tuesday, April 19 at 10:00am** in the 8th floor Diplomatic Reception Rooms of Main State.


At first, the economic growth in China was limited to the big cities along the coast, but it has now spread to the interior villages and towns. Several AAFSW members who served in China and have subsequently returned there as tourists report that they cannot believe the changes: cars vying with bicycles, elegant hotels with spas and swimming pools, stores open to everyone (not just foreigners), workers and entrepreneurs rubbing elbows, and modernized museums that are well-lit and organized!

Despite these changes, the political leadership, though more moderate, is still strong. Because of its rapidly growing economic power, China is being courted by the EU, the U.S., Russia, and the UN. China's leaders, in

turn, are reaching out to the world community with the desire to sell, buy, and invest.

To discuss this complex country and its special importance to the United States, we are fortunate to have an outstanding and well-known speaker, Dr. Banning Garrett, who is the Director of Asia Programs at the Atlantic Council of the United States. He is also an adjunct professor in Political Science at the George Washington University, and a founding member of the Board of Directors of the U.S. Committee of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific (USCSCAP).

Dr. Garrett was a consultant to the Department of Defense and other U.S. government organizations for more than twenty years, and was a Senior Associate at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. He has traveled many times to Asia, including three dozen trips to China since 1981 for discussions with Chinese civilian and military officials and think-tank experts, as well as numerous visits to Taiwan, Japan, and South Korea. He has

published many articles on a wide range of issues, including Chinese foreign policy and views of the strategic environment, Sino-American relations, arms control, and globalization.

Dr. Garrett holds a more optimistic view than the majority of other writers and analysts of China's role in world affairs. Having heard him at the recent Annual World Affairs Conference in Washington, D.C., I can assure you this will be an exciting and challenging lecture. Reserve your place early!

OUR NATION'S CAPITAL: MORE THAN POLITICS AND GOVERNMENT

For the last program of our season, and to welcome the coming of spring, it seems appropriate to review some of the rich and continuing developments in the cultural life of our nation's capital city. Mr. Neale Perl, President of the Washington Performing Arts Society (WPAS), is more than qualified to do so. Please join us on **Tuesday, May 17** at 10:00am in the 8th floor Diplomatic Reception Rooms of Main State.

Mr. Perl was born in New York, and began studying the cello at the age of ten. He graduated from Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore and Temple University in Philadelphia. After being awarded a fellowship to study in Paris with some of the finest cellists, he came to Washington, D.C. in 1980 where he co-founded the Washington Chamber Society. For eight years he served as Executive and Artistic Director of this organization, and performed more than 80 concerts with the ensemble, including performances at the Terrace Theater of the Kennedy

Center and at the French Embassy. Always involved in multiple cultural activities, Mr. Perl helped produce the first American Violin Congress with Sir Yehudi Menuhin, as well as the first World Cello Congress with Mstislav Rostropovich.

After meeting his future wife in Washington, D.C., Mr. Perl moved with his family to La Jolla, California to become Executive Director of the La Jolla Chamber Music Society, one of the leading presenters of classical music on the West Coast. In this capacity, he not only organized major musical events throughout the area, but also established an educational outreach program to advance the careers of top young artists, as well as to collaborate in an after-school enrichment program benefiting youth at risk.

Despite his important achievements and recognition on the West Coast, Mr. Perl and his family loved Washington, D.C. to the extent that he enthusiastically accepted his appointment in September 2001 to



become the third president of the Washington Performing Arts Society. He has already made an impact on the cultural life of our city, and you will be fascinated by the stories of his colorful past and his views and plans for the present and future. Of particular interest to AAFSW members is how over a thirty-year period WPAS has developed a close relationship with fifty foreign embassies and D.C. public schools.

To end the program, and by special request, Mr. Perl will honor us by playing selections on his beloved cello. This is AAFSW's final program before the summer break, and it promises to be delightful. We hope to see you there!
