To date, the Secretary of State Award for Outstanding Volunteerism Abroad (SOSA) numbers 104 winners whose volunteer contributions have impacted the lives of people around the globe.

The SOSA Awards recognize volunteer efforts at U.S. Missions overseas. All active American USG direct-hire employees, their spouses and family members over the age of 18, their EFM domestic partners and members of household are eligible for nomination.

Those nominated demonstrate remarkable service to the Mission community, outstanding activities directed towards their host country, and exceptional service in emergency situations. Nominees are judged on the scope and reach of their volunteer activity, sustainability, ingenuity, and leadership.

### **SOSA History**

At the 2008 SOSA awards ceremony, Under Secretary Patrick Kennedy remarked on the benefits of volunteer efforts. Among the accolades, he said, "Their selfless actions represent grass roots diplomacy at its best."

The AAFSW Secretary of State Award for Outstanding Volunteerism Abroad (SOSA) was established in 1990 with the direct encouragement and support of then Secretary of State James Baker and his wife Susan. While on an official trip, Mrs. Baker was so impressed by the extraordinary volunteer work by members of the Foreign Service community that she decided to establish an award to recognize volunteer accomplishments. Since its inception, the award has been administered by AAFSW.

The first SOSA awards were presented on Foreign Service Day, May 3, 1991. The five recipients — Jairo Granados (Maputo, Mozambique), Mai-Anh Adams (Port Au Prince, Haiti), Joanne Grady (Beijing, China), Sheila Switzer (Madrid, Spain), and Patty Stammerman (Dhahran, Saudi Arabia) also received a "Point of Light" certificate as part of President George H. Bush's "Points of Light" recognition initiative.

Since that time, more than 400 individuals have been nominated for SOSA, with 104 of those winning the prestigious award. The Department of State now organizes the world's countries into six geographical bureaus. Between 1991 and 2009, 73 nominations came from 30 countries in Africa (AF), 56 nominations came from 15 countries in the East Asian and Pacific region (EAP), 118 nominations came from 36 countries in Europe and Eurasia (EUR), 42 nominations came from 12 countries in the Near East Asia region (NEA), 36 nominations were submitted from 10 countries in South and Central Asia (SCA), and 95 nominations came from 25 countries in the Western Hemisphere and the Americas (WHA).

Funding for the award over the past years has included donations from former Secretaries of State, including annual support from Secretary James A. Baker and Secretary George P. Schultz, as well as donations from AAFSW members. Since 2005 the SOSA awards receive a generous annual donation from the Green Family Foundation. Ambassador Steven J. Green (former U.S. Ambassador to Singapore) and the Green Family Foundation began donating to SOSA in 2005. The Green Family Foundation was established to support groups and individuals working for social change. It provides seed grants to support holistic programs that empower entire communities. The foundation's goal is in line with many of SOSA's award-winning projects — "to enable underserved communities to achieve sustainability and self-reliance by alleviating the cycle of poverty and disease." ### **Nominating a Colleague for SOSA**

On an annual basis, AAFSW receives nominations for the Secretary of State Award for Outstanding Volunteerism Abroad from U.S. embassies and consulates throughout the world. One winner is selected from each of the Department of State's six regional bureaus (AF, EAP, EUR, NEA, SCA, and WHA). Members of the U.S. Foreign Service community can nominate a colleague by following the instructions in the award announcement cable, distributed each year in April and posted on the AAFSW website.

### Eligibility

All active American USG direct-hire employees, their spouses and family members over the age of 18, their EFM domestic partners and their members of household are eligible. Previous nominees can be reconsidered if an updated summary statement is included.

#### **Submission of Nominations**

The Secretary of State Award for Outstanding Volunteerism Abroad recognizes volunteer efforts at posts overseas in one or more of the following areas:

- remarkable service to the Mission community,
- outstanding activities directed towards the host country, and
- exceptional service in emergency situations.

#### **Evaluation**

Factors considered in the selection process include:

- scope and reach of activities;
- sustainability;
- ingenuity; and
- leadership.

The SOSA Awards Committee is comprised of the AAFSW President and SOSA Chair, the Director of the Department of State Family Liaison Office, a representative from the Foreign Service Institute's Transition Center, and the Executive Directors from the Department of State's regional bureaus. The committee meets six separate times, considering nominations from each bureau separately.

#### The Award

Winners receive a cash award of \$2,500, a certificate signed by the Secretary of State, and a pin commemorating the annual AAFSW awards ceremony.
